The works (artefacts) in this exhibition explore connection and disconnection and the potential of materials to transform, often in response to external forces such as heat or pressure.

Generally using recycled and found materials, Keron prefers to work with traditional hand tools as this slower process encourages a way of seeing and then re-seeing which, in turn, allows new ideas and forms to emerge in a reflective dialogue with the materials.

Schools: Where I Live

Cromer Junior School and Gresham Village have joined forces to create art to exhibit with Cromer Artspace in April.

It is a rare opportunity for the children to show off their work in an art gallery.

A local artist, Kate Munro, will be running workshops over two days. The children will be picked from years 1 to 6 at Gresham Village and years 3 to 6 at Cromer Junior.

The theme for the work is 'Where I Live', which fits in with the overarching Cromer Artspace theme of 'Cromer Connects'.





This exhibition coincides with Hospice UK Dying Matters Awareness Week, which focusses on the need for honest, transparent conversations about death and dying, to help people feel informed, supported, and empowered.

Art can also help people to reflect on loss and bereavement.

We have selected artists working in a range of media on these topics, including drawing, VR, ceramic and film.

Thinking through drawing Many artists use drawing as a means of thinking things through. That may be an end in itself or a way of developing other work. Drawing may be figurative or abstract, gestural or precise, emotional or philosophical; perhaps all or none of these. Drawing may involve a whole variety of tools and media. Thinking may involve a whole variety of approaches. We have brought together work by artists from our region and beyond, showing some ways of using drawing and some of the ways that artists think. 16 May - 3 June 2024

Michael Horsley

Michael Horsley is a painter who also makes lithographs.

They were made on stones at a print studio in Vác, a small town on the Danube near Budapest, Hungary. Michael would drive there 2 or 3 times a year from his home in Cromer.

The Hungarian master printer István Szabó, was the essential collaborator who Michael worked with for over 20 years.

Making lithographs on stones is a stubbornly slow process, far removed from screen printing or digital technology, but can be immensely rewarding.

The Sands of Time

200 years of Sub cell 3B

Jayne Ivimey discovered that her 3 x great grandfather, a Norwich School artist, had painted 10 Norfolk beach sites in the 1800s capturing the coast before the great changes of the Victorian period.

She decided to revisit the sites with the help of Prof Andrew Watkinson, a UEA climate scientist. to research the stretch from Weybourne to Lowestoft scientifically known as Sub Cell 3B, in order to assess the changes.

With grandfather James Stark looking over her shoulder she redrew the sites and created a 2023 interpretation 200 years later.

Sounding Place

Claire Oxley and Debbie Lyddon

Sounding Place originates from listening to the resonances of the Norfolk landscape. Each piece in the exhibition represents the sonic relationship Debbie and Claire

have with the environment: a response to feeling the sounds and echoes of a place.

Debbie searches out equivalences between the aural and visual rhythms in the landscape: the regular or irregular gaps between objects and sounds, the meandering of contrapuntal voices, and silences or empty spaces.

Historic Pictures Around Cromer

From fishermen and kings to bathing belles and postcards, Cromer Artspace and Cromer Museum have a new exhibition on the streets of Cromer, thanks to funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Building on the success of the collaboration with the National Gallery, Cromer Artspace have obtained £8120 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund to work with 6 Cromer based community groups. There are 12 boards around Cromer featuring a selection from over 15,000 historic photographs, postcards and watercolours in the museum's collection.

Cromer Artspace aims to bring art to Cromer for the benefit of residents and visitors. The charity was set up during the constraints of 2020 and has rapidly become widely recognised as being a significant contributor to the arts in Norfolk. The charity has already established a contemporary art gallery, worked in collaboration with the National Gallery and local businesses to bring art trails to the streets of Cromer and run two small arts festivals and other events. Over 10,000 people have visited Artspace on the Prom each year.
